News from the Tobacco River Muzzle Loaders Club in Beaverton Michigan.

The remaining powder was sold to people there and we made enough money to build some new shooting benches. The new shooting benches will be used by our club members as well as at our annual Hunting Rifle Sighting In Days this November.

We made enough money at this event to make it very likely that we will host the territorial matches again next year. That will be determined at our annual meeting this fall.

Our club membership continues to hover between 90 and 100 but most of our members are only interested in shooting modern firearms. The result of that is that we don't have very many of our club members showing up to help conduct a muzzle loading event. These past two years we have had the good fortune of having Dave Maddox coming to our range to help run the firing line so thank you Dave.

In closing I will say that the Spirit of Roy Keeler Society chose our club this year to receive special recognition for our efforts for keeping our sport alive in the state of Michigan. We have the certificate proudly displayed in our clubhouse so the next time you're at our club please check it out.

Aggregate B Flint offhand championship was won by Justin Burk, 2nd went to Serge Bourdeaux and 3rd went to Jenniffer Burk.


AggregateC Womens Championship went to Jennifer Burk with 2nd going to Manon Gray and 3rd going to Aisha Hendricks.

Shelby Township, Michigan. Competition will begin with a flag raising and memorial ceremony. Shooting competition is open to traditional muzzleloading long-arms. Modern In-line muzzleloaders and poly-patches are not allowed. Conical and jacketed bullets are permitted in rifled muskets. Sight-shades and scopes are not allowed on primitive arms. All loading will be done from pocket or pouch. Loading directly from horn, flask or can is not permitted. Eye and ear protection are required on the range. Period, primitive dress is requested if you are shooting a traditional arms. NMLRA rules are used unless noted. Range Officer's decisions are final. Separate divisions for Rifles and Smoothbores (Tradeguns/Fowlers).
